



# ***2000 VOTER REGISTRATION REPORT***

**June 5, 2001**

Reformatted, corrected and reissued March 16, 2010

***Department of Elections for New Castle County***

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**Note:** This report has been reformatted so that it is similar to the 2005 and 2006 reports. Some of the data in the historical tables has been corrected.

## I. INTRODUCTION

This report provides information regarding Voter Registration within New Castle County for calendar year 2000. It also briefly points out trends and issues as well as making some recommendations.

## II. VOTER REGISTRATION

A. This report consists of five tables that detail various aspects of the voter registration program in New Castle County.

1. The first table, *Voter Registration Transactions*, reports the total number of transactions by type and source for the year 2000.
2. The second table, *New Voter Registrations*, reports the total number of new registrations by source for the years 1991 through 2000.
3. The third table, *Change of Address Transactions*, reports the total number of changes of address by source for the years 1991 through 2000.
4. The fourth table, *Total Transactions*, reports the total number of voter registration transactions by type completed during the years 1991 through 2000.
5. The fifth table, *Voter Removal Programs*, reports the number of persons removed as registered voters by program during the years 1991 through 2000.

B. Trends.

1. The number of change of address transactions has exceeded the number of new registrations since 1998 with the difference increasing each year. There was speculation that the workload resulting from the implementation of the Agency-based Registration Act would decrease over time. That proposition has not proved true. As the number of new registrations has decreased, the number of change of address transactions has increased.

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2. The number of duplicate registrations received has increased dramatically beginning in 1999. The Department retains and files these documents in the event an error was made in the determination that the records were duplicates.
3. The number of persons removed as registered voters has increased in 1999 and 2000 as compared to the years 1994 through 1998. This is due to the implementation of programs permitted under the National Voter Registration Act (NVRA). The removals have not reached the levels of the Failure to Vote purges that were prohibited by NVRA.
4. The number of voter registration applications that must be hand entered in the State's Election Management System database increases dramatically in election years.

C. Issues.

1. The Department does not receive all the applications required through the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) portion of the Agency-based Registration program. Immediately prior to and on the day of the General Election approximately 50 registration appeals were filed with Superior Court. Most of these appeals were DMV generated registrations that were not received and processed by the Department or registrations that were never created through the DMV process when they should have been. Discussions with Election Officers suggest that many other people who claimed that they had registered at DMV but who were not listed on Poll Lists left Polling Places before the issue could be resolved. The Department initiated a study following the 2000 General Election to determine the number of registration documents that were supposed to be generated at DMV and that were not received by the Department. During the period between November 15, 2000 and May 4, 2001 the Department did not receive 191 voter registration applications that were supposed to have been generated at DMV. This is approximately 1.5 transactions per day and does not reflect the number of required transactions that were never generated! In each case of the 191 missing applications, the Department mailed printed and mailed an application to the affected people. As of May 25, 2001, 70 of those applications had been returned to the Department.
2. One of the most serious issues that arose from the Florida debacle and that will most likely be remedied in federal Election Reform legislation, is that people who should have been eligible to vote were not permitted to vote on Election Day. The proposed remedy is that in states where there is no Election Day registration that voters who believe that they are eligible to vote would be permitted to vote a "provisional ballot" on Election Day. The ballot would not be counted until their eligibility was determined following the election. Given Delaware's voting equipment, the only way this could be accomplished, without providing for Election Day registration, is by putting paper ballots in each Polling Place or requiring those persons to go to a

central location to cast such a ballot. Besides serious logistical problems, such a process would place significant additional operational and administrative burdens on our already over-burdened Election Officers. Additionally, the recovery, qualification and counting of these ballots following the election might not be able to be completed prior to the opening of the Court of Canvass.

3. Another Florida debacle issue is the perceived need to give applicants a receipt showing that they applied to register to vote and information regarding the registration and election process.

D. Recommendations

1. Reengineer the DMV process so that all required applications are generated and properly forwarded to the Department. Such a reengineering of the process could also eliminate the need to handle and process duplicate and voided applications.
2. Create the capability to electronically capture registration information at all state agencies participating in the Agency-based Registration Program, at mobile registration events and through WEB generated applications (this does not mean registering over the Internet, it means where a person prints an application from a voter registration application from a State WEB site that the person's information, if provided, be passed electronically to the State's Election Management System).
3. The State develop the capability to forward the status of a person's voter registration application and absentee ballot via e-mail if a person provides his/her e-mail address to the respective Department of Elections.
4. Develop the capability to provide each person who applies to register to vote, except by mail, a receipt showing that they had applied to register to vote. Additionally, provide each person who applies to register to vote a brochure describing the registration process, what to do if they do not receive a Polling Place card, as well as information about Delaware's electoral process.
